

Moderator: Dr Joseph Prabhu is Professor (Emeritus) of Philosophy at California State University, Los Angeles, Adjunct Professor of Religion at Claremont Graduate University, Co-Chair of the Southern California Committee for the Parliament of the World's Religions and a member of The Guibord Center's Advisory Council. Dr. Prabhu is the co-editor of The Interfaith Challenge of Raimon Panikkar, and Indian Ethics, and the author of the forthcoming Liberating Gandhi. A native of India, he has long been active in interfaith and peace work.



Speaker: Dr. Barbara Holdrege is a Professor in the Department of Religious Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara, specializing in South Asian (with an emphasis on Hinduism) and Jewish traditions. Dr. Holdrege research and teaching interests focus on historical and textual studies of Hindu and Jewish traditions and also engage broader theoretical issues arising out of critical interrogation of analytical categories such as the body, space, scripture, and ritual.



Speaker: Dr. Graham Schweig is Director of Studies in Religion at Christopher Newport University, Virginia and Distinguished Teaching and Research Fellow at Mira and Ajay Shingal Center for Dharma Studies at the Graduate Theological Union, Berkeley. Dr. Graham earned his doctorate from Harvard University in comparative religion, with a specialization in sacred Sanskrit yoga literature. Along side of his personal yoga practice, Dr. Schweig has been a student of many traditional teachers of yoga. He has travelled to India and has been a practitioner of meditational and heart-centered yoga for over 45 years.
